- 4. One undergraduate student and one graduate student from each School will be selected at the beginning of each academic year.
- 5. The PBC will elect two co-chairs from the nine identified faculty at start of each academic year to serve for one year. It is desirable for at least one of the co-chairs to be a tenured faculty member.
- 6. MyClasses Canvas site shall be available and training shall be completed by each PBC member prior to their participation in a dismissal appeal.

B. Appeal Process

- 1. A Professional Behavior Violation Appeal Request must be submitted by the student to at least one of the PBC co-chairs within five (5) University business days following notification from the School and/or Program of dismissal.
- 2. An appeal request will generally be reviewed by the PBC co-chairs within three (3) University

- and remedy by the Program. The Program may, in its review of the behavior, determine that lesser sanction(s) are appropriate.
- 3. The panel may also find that the dismissal decision needs to be revisited. In this case, the student, Program Chair and School Director will be notified within twenty-four (24) hours about the need for re-evaluation by the Program. The Program may, in its review of the behavior, determine that lesser sanction(s) are appropriate or that the original dismissal decision should be upheld. If the original dismissal decision is upheld, the student may appeal the decision to the Provost or the Provost's designee as stated in E1, above.

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
